

Have you been longing for more storage space in your kitchen cabinets and linen closet? Donating gently used pots, pans, cutting boards, measuring cups, mixing bowls, utensils, and even can openers could solve your space problems and help a refugee family put a meal on their table in this new country! Bedding no longer needed by your grown family can warm a refugee family that has arrived in a safe place but needs everyday items to start their new life. If giving a financial donation is easier for you, please know that your dollars can become anything that family needs, and they are so grateful for your generosity. Please check the list of other needed items later in this article, such as underwear, laundry detergent, diapers and baby wipes, feminine hygiene products, children's toys, and other items, and please reach out if you need assistance in transporting your donations to our church.

This Sunday, April 3, the Presbyterian Women's group of this congregation will host the returning Spring Mission Workshop live and by Zoom. Everyone is invited to eat a brown bag lunch together in the Courtyard immediately after worship (weather permitting), where water and individually-wrapped cookies will be provided, followed by the speaker and activities in the Westminster Room. If you find you can come at the last minute, we will have extra brown bag lunches for you! Our speaker also will be available on Zoom if that's easier for you, and the Zoom link will be provided later this week.

Our wonderful speaker, Karen Duncan, who is the Tallahassee Community Outreach and Engagement Coordinator for the IRC (International Rescue Committee), will tell us more about her organization and her work with refugee families who are arriving in Tallahassee with little or nothing. Hands-on activities for in-person attendees, adults and children, will include sorting socks that will be given away by Beyond the Pantry, a Tallahassee-based non-profit that shares basic needs products; completing small sewing projects begun by Together in Service members; assembling and sending beautiful handmade cards with messages of Easter and hope, love and welcome; putting the finishing touches on marblemaze hand toys; learning about efforts to better care for the Earth; and, preparing to transport the vegetable seedlings started by our Sunday school children to share with refugee families.

Sunday Festival Readings

APRIL 3, 2022 FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT

JOSHUA 5:9-12 PSALM 32 II CORINTHIANS 5:16-21 LUKE 15:1-3, 11B-32



Holy scripture teaches us that God created humankind in god's own image. Christ calls us to love God, with all our mind, soul, and heart, and our neighbor as ourselves. With this comes the sacred responsibility to treat each human being with the love and respect due to a child of God.

We acknowledge the long history of systemic racism that, through violence, laws, policies, and their implementation, was intended to exclude persons who are not Caucasian from benefits and opportunities – from the first European settlers who considered themselves entitled to land and violently displaced indigenous people from their homes, to the equally long history of slavery which built the wealth of this country, to Jim Crow laws to current instances of police brutality and the overwhelming mass incarceration of people of color.

We declare ourselves utterly opposed to all forms of systemic racism. We are committed to standing with those who find themselves on the receiving end of any form of racism. We will seek out opportunities to oppose all forms of systematic racism and to ensure that black lives matter, as do those of indigenous, Asian, and Latinx people and persons of all colors or countries of origin.

Our faith tells us that we can do no less, if we truly affirm that all human beings are made in god's image.

We dream of a day in which all persons are treated as bearers of that image.
