
#### We're Collecting Donated Food Again





## Adult Church School

Sunday, October 23, 2022 9:30 a.m. start time (9:15 a.m. meet and greet)

#### Restorative Practices in the Bible with guest Henry L. McClendon, Jr.

The aim of Restorative Practices (RP) is to "build community and to manage conflicts by repairing harm and restoring relationship." On Sunday morning, we will explore the biblical view of RP including its origin, purpose and intended result. We will also see examples of how using a restorative approach can help strengthen good relationships and enable Christians to carry out the biblical mandate to be reconciled found in 2 Corinthians 5:14-21.

Our guest for this program is Henry L. McClendon, Jr., who will also be leading our Listening Circle later in the afternoon on Sunday. Henry is a lifelong resident of Detroit, Ml. He currently serves as the International Institute for Restorative Practices (IIRP) Graduate Schools, Director of Community Engagement. He is also a former Vice Chair of its International Board of Trustees.

His work focuses on the infusion of restorative practices into multiple systems (schools, police, employment and training, health, courts, non-profits, neighborhood block clubs, youth serving agencies and churches) to improve the culture and climate among the people working within those systems and the people they serve.

His professional experience also includes: six years - U.S. Army Reserve Officer; seven years - Executive Assistant to the Honorable Detroit Mayor Coleman A. Young, Sr.; five years - Southeast Michigan Area Director and Transition of Prisoners (TOP) Director for Prison Fellowship Ministries; eight and a half years - Director of Youth Development at New Detroit, Inc. focusing on best practices in K-12 education; and six years - Education and Community Leadership Program Officer for The Detroit based Skillman Foundation. Additionally, he has thirty-six years of experience in a variety of pastoral ministries, including sixteen years in his current assignment as Pastor of Berean Chapel of Detroit.

He is married to his wife of 37 years, Cheryl! They are proud parents of three adult children and 4 totally awesome grandchildren!

Our faith tells us that we can do no less, if we truly affirm that all human beings are made in god's image.

We dream of a day in which all persons are treated as bearers of that image.


