EJI RACIAL JUSTICE ESSAY CONTEST

The Equal Justice Initiative in partnership with the Tallahassee Community Remembrance Project is pleased to announce a scholarship contest open to 9th – 12th grade students attending public high school in Leon County, where prizes totaling at least \$5,000 will be awarded to winning participants.

Students are asked to examine the history of a topic of racial injustice and to discuss its legacy today. Essays should explain the chosen topic using a specific

historical event(s), explore how the injustice persists, and imagine solutions

for a future free from racial injustice. Students are encouraged to reflect on how the topic impacts their own lives and communities.



The City of Tallahassee is a long-standing leader in protecting and caring for our natural resources. The City underscored its commitment with the adoption of its Clean Energy Resolution, which set a target of achieving 100 percent net, clean renewable energy. A plan is being developed to guide the way forward, and continued community input will ensure it reflects local values and needs while maintaining affordability, equity, reliability, safety and more.

Since beginning the planning effort, the City has engaged thousands of residents through surveys and community meetings as part of ongoing conversations about achieving these clean energy goals. Your Compassion and Social Justice Ministry Team is committed to providing a monthly opportunity for members of the congregation to put hands and feet to their faith by serving our less fortunate neighbors. Already we have a monthly commitment to feed the homeless at Grace Mission on the second Sunday from 4 - 6. We are also working again with Second Harvest, our local food bank serving low income

people from Leon and 16 surrounding counties. In talking with their volunteer coordinator, she highlighted a renewed effort they are starting--bread boxing. In the past, we've sorted canned goods, checked dates to assure the food is within guidelines, and worked in the cooler. This sounds like it requires less physical effort so anyone can do it. She has said that they could use up to 10 volunteers; we'd like to have at least 6. Right now we've set our volunteer time as the first Friday of the month--December 2 next month. We will be there from 9:45 - 12. Holy scripture teaches us that God created humankind in god's own image. Christ calls us to love God, with all our mind, soul, and heart, and our neighbor as ourselves. With this comes the sacred responsibility to treat each human being with the love and respect due to a child of God.

We acknowledge the long history of systemic racism that, through violence, laws, policies, and their implementation, was intended to exclude persons who are not Caucasian from benefits and opportunities from the first European settlers who considered themselves entitled to land and violently displaced indigenous people from their homes, to the equally long history of slavery which built the wealth of this country, to Jim Crow laws to current instances of police brutality and the overwhelming mass incarceration of people of color.

We will seek out opportunities to oppose all forms of systematic racism and to ensure that black lives matter, as do those of indigenous, Asian, and Latinx people and persons of all colors or countries of origin.

Our faith tells us that we can do no less, if we truly affirm that all human beings are made in god's image.

We dream of a day in which all persons are treated as bearers of that image.


