

Death Penalty in Florida

First Presbyterian Church has long been a proud advocate for ending capital punishment and seeking alternatives to the death penalty.

This Tuesday, July 8, at 11 AM, First Pres will host a press conference announcing the release of a letter signed by Florida faith leaders asking Gov. DeSantis to announce a moratorium on executions. The event will be livestreamed on our YouTube page <u>here</u>.

Floridians for Alternatives to the Death Penalty has invited faith leaders, including clergy and lay leaders (such as Elders!), from all religions and denominations to sign this letter. You can read the <u>full text of the letter</u> <u>here</u> and access the <u>form to officially sign here</u>. Please share this with other faith leaders who share our commitment to non-violence and forgiveness.

Gov. DeSantis has signed his ninth death warrant of 2025; if approved, this will set a modern-era record for the number of executions approved by a Florida governor in one year.

Prisoner: Michael Bell **Victims:** Jimmie West and Tamecka Smith **Vigil:** Tuesday, July 15, 6 PM, Governor's Mansion **Service of Remembrance:** Wednesday, July 16, Noon, Capital Rotunda

Prisoner: Edward Zakrzewski Victims: Sylvia, Edward, and Anna Zakrzewski Vigil: Thursday, July 31, 6 PM, Governor's Mansion Service of Remembrance: Friday, August 1, Noon, Capital Rotunda




Pastoral Note

The Season of Prayer and Reflection for Peace on the Korean Peninsula is an annual period from June 25 to August 15. Why these dates? August 15 commemorates Korea's liberation from Japan in 1945, and June 25 marks the beginning of the Korean War in 1950.

Many Americans believe the war ended in 1953; however, only an armistice was signed at that time. While fighting and military engagements have paused, the state of war has lasted for 75 years.

Since the 225th General Assembly, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has been advocating for peace, reunification, and denuclearization of the Korean Peninsula. Presbyterians support replacing the current ceasefire agreement with a lasting peace treaty. They have also urged the U.S. Congress to lift its ban that prevents U.S. citizens of Korean descent from traveling to North Korea to visit their families, from whom they have been separated due to the division. North Korea remains one of the most heavily sanctioned countries. According to the report "The Case Against Economic Sanctions," the sanctions imposed by the United States on North Korea are estimated to have caused thousands of deaths due to disruptions in supplies of medicines and other essential goods. The 225th General Assembly directed the church to review its policy that endorses the use of sanctions to effect change.



Our Christian partners in Korea, including the Presbyterian Church in the Republic of Korea, are committed to supporting our mission. Korea, the National Council of Churches in Korea, and the World Council of Churches are encouraging policymakers in Korea and the U.S. to end policies that increase hostility. We can join them in advocating for opening the doors to gradual mutual trust-building and the cultivation of peace to replace ongoing war regimes.
