

# Gathering to Worship, Reaching Out to Serve: Highlighting the work of First Pres

In the Stewardship Campaign's Vision Survey, many respondents expressed a desire to know more about the work of the church. In the coming weeks, the newsletter will include descriptions of many of the various projects that First Pres and its members undertake at the church, both within our congregation and in relation to our wider community.

### Opposition to the Death Penalty: Prayer Service, Vigil, Service of Remembrance

Longtime members of First Pres know that our congregation's opposition to the death penalty has not wavered over the decades; the PC(USA) has condemned it since 1959. You've likely seen local death penalty events listed on the church calendar and newsletter or heard a congregant give a Minute for Mission during worship. In July, FPC hosted the Florida Faith Leaders Press Conference on Executions, organized by Floridians for Alternatives to the Death Penalty. Each time there is an execution, members of FPC join others in our community for events led by the Tallahassee Citizens Against the Death Penalty.

The night of the execution, people gather in the parking lot in front of the Governor's Mansion for a vigil. Words of faith from different traditions around the world are read aloud, and then a volunteer reads the names of each of the prisoners executed under the current Governor. A member of First Pres rings one of our own handbells to mark each name; at this time, there have been 23 executions under Governor Ron DeSantis, 14 of which have occurred this year, with another three scheduled already for the coming months. The service concludes with singing "Light a Candle in the Darkness," a song written by Mary Louise Bringle and given to TCADP to provide hope for the end of the death penalty.

The following day in the Capitol atrium, a service of remembrance is held to acknowledge the death of the prisoner and the death(s) of his victim(s). Participants alternate between reading quotes from political and faith leaders that are in opposition to the death penalty and singing songs of comfort and hope, accompanied by the guitar. Liturgies are used in both services, a copy of each is signed by all present, and they are then presented to the Governor's Office following the end of the service.

While the end of the death penalty will take political action and will, these services offer a chance to express our opposition to our leaders and find strength through community. We hope you'll join us.
